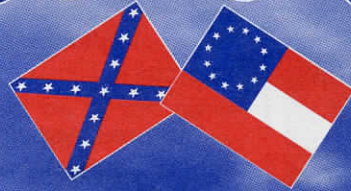

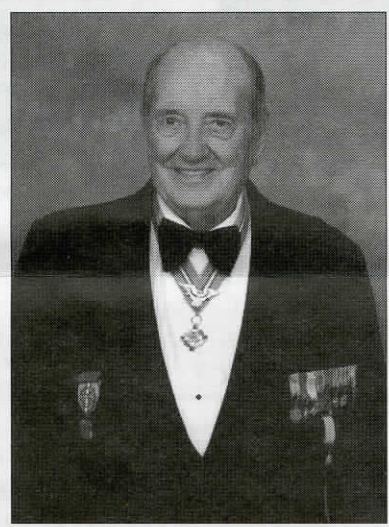

FROM THE COMMANDER-GENERAL

On December 23, 1776, while encamped with General George Washington's troops, Thomas Paine wrote these words:

"These are the times that try men's souls: The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of his country; but he that stands it NOW, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered; yet we have this consolation with us, that the harder the conflict, the more glorious the triumph."



also reads: "This Preamble shall not be subject to amendment or change."

Additionally, Article II, Section 1 c of our Constitution also states that we are "To provide for future generations of the descendants of Confederate officers and civilian officials in the Executive and Legislative branches of government an organization to commemorate and honor the leadership of their forefathers"

WE HAVE BEEN IN VIOLATION OF OUR PREAMBLE, NOW WE ARE REACHING OUT TO THE DESCENDANTS OF THE EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE BRANCHES OF GOVERNMENT FOR THE RECOGNITION THEY SO DESERVE.

I ask this question: Are we summer soldiers and sunshine patriots who will shrink from service and loyalty to our Military Order of Stars and Bars?

I often hear criticism that our problems with the SCV began with our removal of the requirement that one must belong to the SCV in order to belong to the MOS&B.

Why was the requirement removed?

THE ANSWER IS SIMPLE!

Our Constitution Preamble states that "male descendants of Confederate Officers as well as male descendants of the elected and appointed officials of the Confederate Executive and Legislative branches of government unite to form the Military Order of Stars and Bars". The Preamble

Under SCV requirements, one must have had a soldier ancestor in order to belong to the SCV. Several times, amendments were offered to the delegates at SCV conventions to allow membership for those who served in the Confederate Legislative and Executive Branches of Government. All failed to pass.

Even President Jefferson Davis' descendants could not join the SCV, but his descendants can now join the MOS&B under the current requirements of our Constitution.

Remember this: Had the joint membership requirement not been dropped, the SCV could

expel a member and that person would also automatically have been expelled from the MOS&B. Removing the joint membership requirement has allowed many good MOS&B members to remain in our organization, although they have been suspended from the SCV.

Several years ago, the SCV began to take several punitive actions against the MOS&B.

1. They said we were taking up too much time at "their" convention.

Results: For three consecutive conventions, we have had to meet earlier in the week than the SCV, and pay for extended time if members wanted to attend SCV activities.

2. They removed or suspended both SCV and MOS&B members from their organization.

Results: There was great consternation that we did not expel the members from the MOS&B that they had expelled from the SCV.

3. They removed your Commander General as an Ex Officio (nonvoting) member of the SCV Executive Council.

Results: The Commander General cannot work toward better relationships with the SCV.

On April 23, the SCV began the severance of relationships with the MOS&B. Note: we have always been a separate organization.

On that date, an SCV ad hoc committee on SCV/MOS&B relationships made a report to the SCV General Executive Council.

Three recommendations were presented:

A. That the SCV/GEC proceed to make effective legal and practical arrangements to dissolve its official tangible relationship with the MOS&B, including the satisfaction of the MOS&B's 10% ownership interest in SCV GHQ (Elm Springs).

B. Since the SCV and the MOS&B share many common goals and interests, it may be advantageous to pursue the discussions outlined above at some future time. The SCV leadership, therefore, should maintain a LOW LEVEL DIALOGUE with the leadership of the MOS&B.

C. That this report be considered final and that this committee be dissolved.

The report was adopted.

Since that report, I have received letters, signed by the Assistant Judge Advocate of the SCV, extending formal offers to purchase our 10% interest in Elm Springs.

I have appointed Past Commander General Albert Jones to Chair and explore all aspects of the SCV purchase proposal. It is fortunate that we have such a qualified person as Albert to handle this difficult task.

Additionally, I appointed AOT Commander Phil Law to Chair a Headquarters Operation Committee composed of some of our leaders. They all have many areas of expertise in their résumés. This Committee is actively working to explore options available for us to remove ourselves from Elm Springs. We are fortunate to have Commander Phil and his committee to work on this delicate task. They, too, are well qualified to handle such a difficult issue.

Issues involving the SCV have taken much of my time, as well as time of your Executive Council. In spite of the SCV, your leadership continues to work to make the MOS&B a viable heritage organization. Recently, it was my pleasure to attend, together with other MOS&B members, the dedication in Columbia, SC, of the marker denoting the founding of the MOS&B. The South Carolina members of the MOS&B, including Brett Bradshaw, Tom Thomas, and Steve Wolff, did an outstanding job of arranging and sponsoring the dedication. I wish that more members could have been in attendance.

The outstanding programs that we have in place that bring honor to the MOS&B include: The Jackson Medal Program; The Legacy Endowment Program; The Literary Awards Program; The Scholarship Program (seven given this year for \$1,000 each.), and the publishing of a History Book for the Order.

In spite of our emphasis on heritage issues and programs of value, we are now seeing open disloyalty on the part of some members of the MOS&B to our principles and purposes. I have received e-mail from SCV and MOS&B members who have made derogatory statements about the MOS&B. One indicated that we were a cancer to

the SCV. Several others have said that if they can get "some of their people into the MOS&B" that they will be able to take over and do what they wished with our organization. One MOS&B member was adamant that if the SCV expelled a member, then we should immediately drop him from the MOS&B.

Our programs are and should be a source of pride to the membership of the MOS&B, but an organization such as ours cannot survive on pride alone. Without the loyalty and devotion of our members to our Principles and Purposes we stand as an organization without merit. Membership loyalty will be the goal we will strive to meet as we move forward. Anything less will not be acceptable.

My thanks go to the Executive Council and the other appointed and elected committees and officers that have served the Order so well this year. I also appreciate the service of you, who serve at the Army, Society and Chapter level

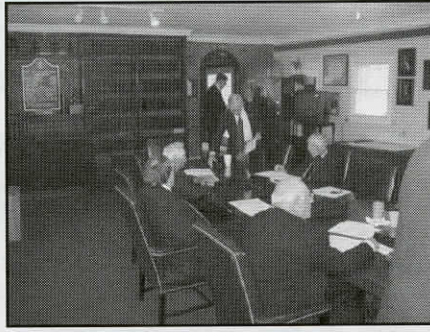

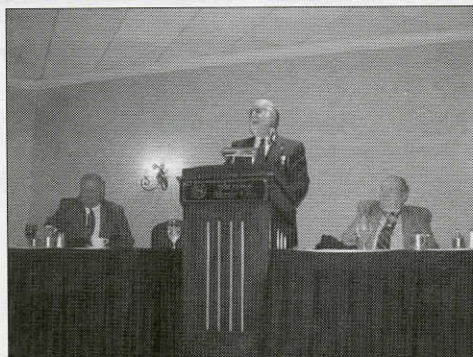

**HISTORICAL MARKER DEDICATED—
REMEMBERING OUR FOUNDING**

MAIN STREET HISTORICAL MARKER

COLUMBIA --- Although the cool marble of the lobby floors of the Jefferson Hotel are long gone, descendants of the group founded in those halls honored their past recently. Those who followed the founders of the Military Order of the Stars and Bars gathered on August 27 to unveil a historic highway marker for the site. On August 30, 1938, during the 48th reunion of the United Confederate Veterans, 17 former commissioned officers of the Army of the Confederate States of America met in the halls of the Jefferson Hotel and organized a fraternal order of Confederate officers and their descendants. Also there were 47 men whose fathers had been Confederate officers. They named the fraternity the Order of the Stars and Bars.

Fast forward 67 years. The descendants, now named the Military Order of the Stars and Bars, erected a South Carolina state historical highway plaque at the site of the former hotel. The fraternity is a genealogical society consisting of descendants of the original order. The plaque, unveiled by

various state society members, noted the origins of the hotel and the origins of their order. Written on the plaque is: "The Jefferson Hotel, designed and built by Columbia entrepreneur and contractor John Jefferson Cain (1869-1929), stood here at the corner of Main and Laurel Streets from 1913 until 1968.

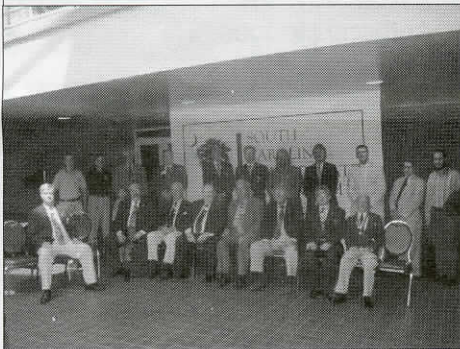
The hotel (also sometimes called the Hotel Jefferson) was built in 1912-13 at a cost of \$250,000. Notable features included Indiana limestone on the 1st and 6th story exteriors and mahogany, marble and terra cotta tile throughout the lobby, dining room, and ballroom. For 55 years the Jefferson was Columbia's premier hotel, hosting conventions as well as more informal meetings among legislators, Demolished in 1968, it was replaced by the Jefferson Square complex. In 1938, during the 48th Reunion of the United Confederate Veterans, former officers and descendants met at the hotel to organize the Order

of the Stars and Bars. Now the Military Order of the Stars and Bars, the group is a genealogical society consisting of their descendants. Erected by the Military Order of Stars and Bars, 2005."

The Order's current head, Commander-General Daniel W. Jones of Salisbury, North Carolina was here in Columbia to formally dedicate the new historical marker. A group of thirty-two officers and members of the organization gathered at the corner of Main Street and Laurel, at the current Jefferson Center, for the ceremony. "This is a watershed event in the history of our Order," said Jones. "Now new members can get a tangible sense of where the organization was started."

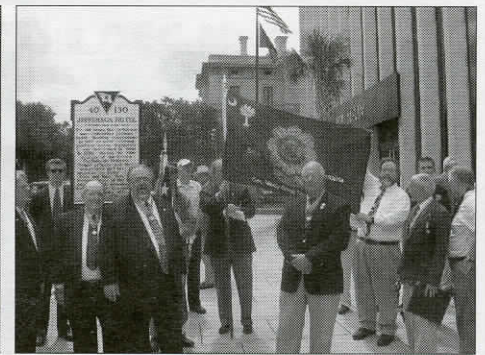

Pursuant to directions from Commander General Daniel Jones, the MOSB is formally announcing the process and procedure for the **BEAUVOIR RELIEF FUND**. Cmdr. Jones has asked Army of Tennessee Commander Phillip Law to coordinate this relief effort. I have spoken with Rick Forte, President of the Beauvoir board this morning. Rick said some looting has occurred, and graphically described the destruction in and around the grounds. Currently there are several folks onsite, but the temperature is stifling, and there is no electricity, water, etc.. All local stores on the beachfront are totally destroyed.

Commander Law, who resides in nearby Mobile, Alabama, will serve as the local coordinator of donations and the relief effort. At this time, donations are urgently requested to be sent to: Make checks/MO's payable to: **MOSB** and reference "**Beauvoir Relief Fund**" in the Memo line.

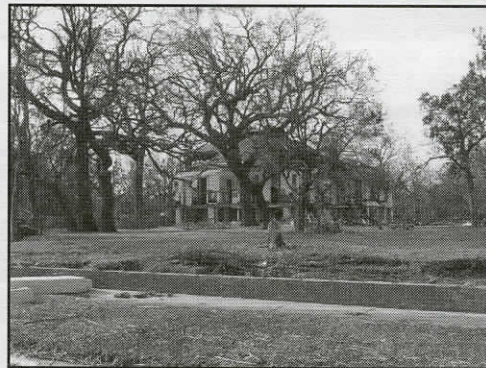
the UDC, the Civil War Roundtables, and our numerous Friends of the Confederacy. This is the time to rally all good Southern Folks.

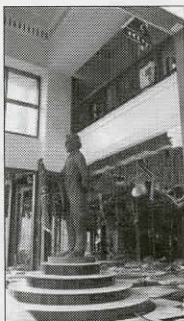

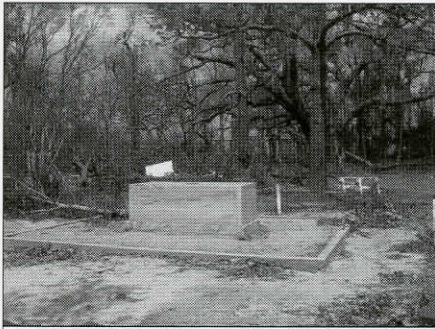

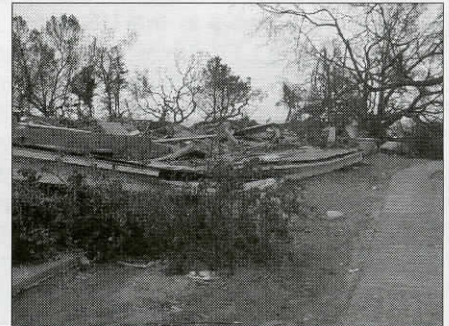

BEAUVOIR'S "BEAUTIFUL VIEW" DEVASTATED BY KATRINA

With a fury, Hurricane Katrina came roaring across the Mississippi Gulf Coast. In her wake, she left the twisted remains of history. Decades of Mississippi disappeared. Yet, one important historic home remains, severely damaged but not destroyed.

Beauvoir, the last home of Jefferson F. Davis, suffered severe damage from the waves and winds of Katrina. Only two of the buildings remain, the mansion and the Presidential Library. The positive news is that both of these will be repaired, with adequate time and funds.

Listed on the National Historic Register, Beauvoir is also a National Historic Landmark, as well as one of Mississippi's Archaeological Landmarks. Jefferson Davis spent his last years here, enjoying the view,

and writing his memoirs. Davis' professional career included years as the President of the Confederate States of America, and also as a prominent leader in the United States. He served in positions such as Secretary of War under President Franklin Pierce, a U. S. Senator from Mississippi, and was a renowned military leader in the Mexican War.

Today, Beauvoir is one of the few remaining historical sites on the Coast. With all the devastation left by Katrina, Beauvoir, in the words of many, has become the "spirit of determination of recovery on the Coast." It has become the heart of the cultural and historical rebuilding. The mansion and Presidential Library both can be rebuilt, but it is going to require help from all. (Visit our website at <http://beauvoir.org/> to view some of the damage.)

Efforts are underway now to begin Beauvoir recovery, but we need your financial assistance. Staff members, working with members of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, have already begun removing many items for preservation. Your donations are needed more than ever.

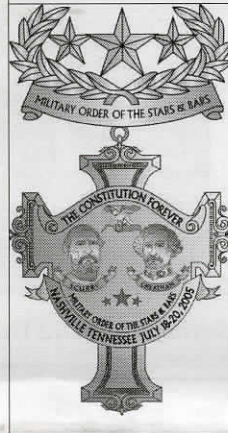
GONE, BUT NEVER FORGOTTEN

Peter William Orlebeke joined the Church Triumphant on July 4 after a courageous battle with lung cancer. Pete was born on June 18, 1940, in San Angelo, Texas, to John William and Lorene Curry Orlebeke. He was a 6th-generation Texan from pioneers of Freestone County. He was married 35 years to Carolyn McWhirter from Longview. Pete graduated from UT Austin 1962 and was a Sigma Chi. He served 6 years in the US Army Reserve, settling in Dallas, joining LTV Aerospace/Kentron Hawaii, and later was a technical publications consultant. Memberships included Military Order of the Stars and Bars; Society of the War of 1812; Order of Southern Cross; Sons of the American Revolution, Dallas Chapter Past President; and Sons of Confederate Veterans, serving as Commander-in-Chief, 1996-98. In 2005 Pete became a founder and charter member of the Descendants of Confederate Veterans. Honors bestowed on Pete include Admiral of the Texas Navy; Honorary Admiral in the Great State of Alabama Navy; Honorary Order of Kentucky Colonels; Tennessee Squires; Honorary Colonel of Alabama Militia; Honorary Citizen of the State



of Oklahoma; Advisory Board of Directors for the Confederate Research Center at Hill College, Hillsboro; and Honorary Chairman of the Albert Sidney Johnston Confederate Debutante Ball, River Oaks Country Club, Houston, where for the past 15 years he led the singing of a rousing rendition of Dixie. Memorial services will be held at Highland Park Presbyterian Church at 9:30 a.m. on July 9. The interment will follow at 2:30 p.m., Salem Cemetery near Teague.
